Context

"English for Health and Behavioural Sciences" is a (4th year) optional course within the BA programme in Physiotherapy at the University of the Balearic Islands. This courseprimarily aims at providing students with the language competence necessary to communicate effectively in their professional environment (B2 level – Common European Framework of Reference for Languages), and helping them to gain confidence when using English in their academic and professional lives. The course will follow a practical approach to language issues, which does not however preclude the inclusion of several theoretical sessions aiming at developing explicit knowledge concerning particularly complex language issues (grammar, specialized medical vocabulary, pronunciation or idiomatic language).

Requirements

This course is addressed to 4th-year Physiotherapy students. For this reason, they should have at least 168 ECTS credits (excluding optional credits) before registering for this course.

Recommended

This subject will be **entirely taught in English**. Therefore,an intermediate level of English (B1 - Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) is needed before the beginning of the course. This is the level of English students should have reached at the end of their high school studies and the one required to pass university access exams.

Students who do not have this level of English will find a list of self-study resources in the bibliographical section of this guide and it is their responsibility to reach this level prior to the course commencement. In addition, UIB students have the "English Lab" room at their disposal to use the varied resources for the study

2. Listening

Understanding and reacting to real life dialogues and oral texts on topics related to the field of Physiotherapy followed by comprehension exercises.

3. Speaking

Producing real life dialogues and oral texts on topics related to the field of Physiotherapy.

Individual interventions and group debates on relevant topics, pair conversations interaction in simulated real life contexts.

Grammatical correctness in the production of speech.

Fluent and accurate production of the specific sounds of English.

4. Writing

Applying the grammatical rules and vocabulary learned in class to the written text in order to produce documents that comply with the standard conventions.

5. Reading

Understanding written texts on topics related to the field of Physiotherapy followed by comprehension exercises, as well as analysing model texts from medical contexts.

Identifying useful vocabulary and general understanding of the text.

Teaching methodology

This subject will be entirely taught in English.

A student will be considered "No Presentat" (NP) when they have taken a third or less of those tests that constitute the subject's assessment as specified in the "Guia Docent".

In those cases where the addition of the applicable assessment percentages is higher than 5 but one or more of the assessment parts fail to meet the required criteria, the final grade will be 4'5 (Article 26, Reglament Acadèmic).

2. Class attendance

There is only one assessment pathway. Class attendance is highly advisable, even though it is not compulsory to pass the course.
